Paper

The object of the paper is to write an account of one year of English history since 1660. You should take care to offer as comprehensive a discussion as possible—treating such matters as politics, foreign policy, sport, fashion, and the arts. You should as well be alert both to describe how the events of the year looked to contemporaries and to place your chosen year in the broader chronology of English history.

Papers will be graded on their style and readability as well as on their content. Please, therefore, take care with your writing. Papers must be typewritten, contain footnotes and Bibliography, and are due on 30 November. Please note that no late papers will be accepted.
