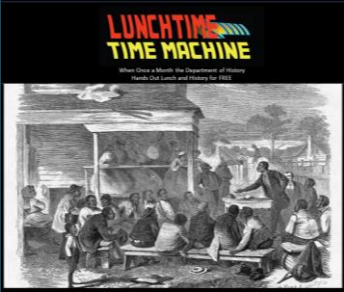


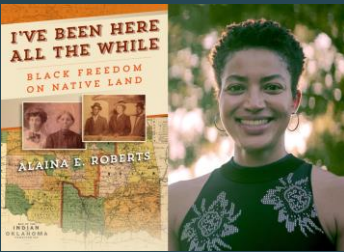
Black History Month 2024

"How did the murder of a Black activist end Reconstruction in North Carolina."

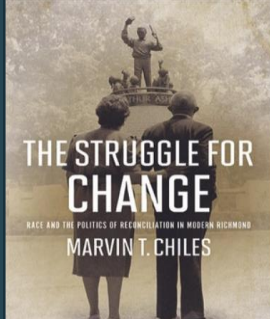
Dr. Nelson writes and teaches about 19th-century history including the history of slavery, international finance, the history of science, and global commodities.
